

Swedish Hoof School trimming clinic.

There are only two simple rules to trimming!

These two rules apply to all and every horse. Age, sex, breed, riding discipline and health status does not change the fact that an anatomically perfect hoof is a perfect hoof. These two rules are so formulated that the exact same rules apply to every single hoof without exceptions but the result will look different depending on the condition of each unique hoof. (The only thing that can put sand in the machinery is a deformed coffin bone.) The reason this works so good is because none of us can create a perfect hoof but all of us can learn to create a foundation that is good enough for the horse to create a perfect hoof from. We can not cure flares, wall cracks, under run heels, coffin bone rotation or sinkers but with our help the only other thing the horse needs is a little time.

So where is the catch?

The "catch" is that we must learn where to look to see what the horse want us to help him with. This is so easy. Trimming is just "natural ware done artificially" and the horse is already trying to tell you what he needs. You only have to learn to understand what he is showing you. You don't need to keep track of any angles or measurements and of course the horse should feel better even right after trimming than he did before.

If you think all this sound "too good to be true" then that is most likely because your opinion is based on traditional hoof knowledge and that is why my 2 days hoof theory seminar is mandatory before attending the trimming clinic. You must have understood how the hoof really works before you can understand what he is trying to show you. Traditional hoof knowledge is not going to help you and therefore no prior knowledge or experience is required. If you have prior knowledge you must have a very open mind and be ready to evaluate everything you know against everything you hear.

It doesn't even matter if you are planning to do all or no trimming at all on your horse. Since you are responsible for his welfare you need this knowledge to understand what he needs.

I know that there are multiple trimming methods out there and I'm not saying that I reach better results than everybody else but this might just be an easier and sometimes more effective way of getting there. Even more important is that this method is extremely logical and easy to understand.

And by the way; the horse's anatomy does not change because he is going barefoot, in boots or in shoes so why should the trimming?
